Who is JLEAG?




- ▶ JLEAG is a collective of individuals with firsthand experience in the justice system.

The Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) is a framework to redirect people with mental health and substance use disorders away from the criminal justice system at key points, like law enforcement contact and court involvement, toward treatment and support to reduce recidivism and promote recovery.

It offers a community-specific lens to identify opportunities for deflection, diversion, and support at every step, shifting to healing and restoration and preventing deeper system involvement.

Sequential Intercept Model Report

- ► Helps to better understand the relationship between behavioral health systems and the criminal-legal system.
- Provides a structured way to analyze how individuals with behavioral health needs interact with criminal-legal agencies.
- Identifies opportunities to divert individuals away from the justice system and into more appropriate community settings. This is achieved through candid discussions among stakeholders from health, justice, and social service agencies, allowing for a shared understanding of system strengths, gaps, and opportunities for improvement.
- Divides the criminal-legal system into various "Intercepts" that highlight how different agencies interact with people as they move through the system.

Intercept O - Community Services Preventing Justice Involvement through upstream support

- Connects people who have mental and substance use disorders with services before they come into contact with the criminal justice system.
- Supports law enforcement in responding to both public safety emergencies and mental health crises.
- **Enables deflection** to treatment **before** an **arrest** takes place.
- Reduces pressure on resources at local emergency departments and inpatient psychiatric beds/units for urgent but less acute mental health needs.
- ▶ <u>Shifts focus to intervention earlier</u> in the legal process to access treatment sooner and potentially avoid deeper involvement in the justice system.

Justice-Involved Homeless

Incarceration and homelessness are mutual drivers

People who have experienced incarceration are 10 times more likely than the general public to experience homelessness.

Even if not homeless when entering jail, incarceration often results in losing a job and income, rental lease, car, legal fees, etc, effectively making a person homeless.

Similarly, homeless individuals who are incarcerated for minor offenses related to being homeless often experience further harm and exacerbation of physical and mental health issues.

It costs approximately \$307 a day to incarcerate someone. (\$112,000 a year)

Programs & Services

Going Home Hawai`i provides reentry and recovery housing facilities on Hawai`i Island for justice-involved individuals. Housing programs are intended for longer-term stays to provide the time needed for career development, achievement of employment and/or educational goals, securing permanent housing, and other goals contributing to stabilization and a lasting return to the community.

Reentry & Recovery Housing Pu`uhonua Wellness Centers

Reentry & Recovery Housing programs are intended for longer-term stays, providing the time needed for career development, achievement of employment and/or educational pathways, securing permanent housing, and other goals contributing to stabilization and a lasting return to the community.





Kona Reentry Program

52 Reentry/Recovery Housing beds

(8 Beds for Women) / Units Are Gender-Specific

Program Fee: \$500/month

2 Bedroom/1 Bath Shared Units

The Kailua-Kona program includes Affordable Rental Housing (ARH) units for justice-involved individuals that may need an extended period of time to obtain stable, independent housing.

Affordable Rental Housing (ARH) units are limited and includes a formal rental application process.

Pu'uhonua Wellness Center: Men

Located in Hilo at 3 locations, this program has 22 beds and we accept men 18+ years who have been involved with the criminal justice system within the past 2 years.

Participants must:

- Be employed or actively seeking employment and/or job training, or
- Be enrolled in or actively applying for higher education aimed towards employment
- Have the ability to pay a monthly program fee of \$450
- Be able to live independently
- Be relatively self-sufficient, clean and sober from alcohol and/or illegal substances





Pu'uhonua Wellness Center: Women





Located in Hilo, this program has 8 beds.

We accept women 18+ years who have been involved with the criminal justice system within the past 2 years.

Women must:

- Be employed or actively seeking employment and/or job training, or
- Be enrolled in or actively applying for higher education aimed towards employment
- Have the ability to pay a monthly program fee of \$450
- Be able to live independently
- Be relatively self-sufficient, clean and sober from alcohol and/or illegal substances

Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Reentry Care Coordination Services

Sentenced Adults in the criminal justice system with a SUD and/or co-occurring substance use and mental health disorders, who are returning to their families and community following a period of incarceration in state and local prisons, jails, or detention centers. Initial engagement 90 days prior to release.



9-Months: Window of Hope

Provides supportive services for pregnant women 18+ years who are struggling with or at risk for alcohol and substance use in Hawai'i Island.


